

CAMDEN NEWS NOTES

** President Wolverton will announce the various standing committees at an adjourned meeting of City Council tonight.

** What was formerly the old Camden and Atlantic division of the Pennsylvania Railroad has been elevated the past month from Newton to Kaighn avenues. Bridges have been erected over all the streets between those two points.
