

OVER IN CAMDEN

Recorder Nowrey yesterday fined Enoch Briscoe, colored, \$3.75 for shooting crap.

The West Jersey Orphanage for Destitute Colored Children has fixed Tuesday, November 29, as donation day.

Suit for \$20000 damages was instituted by Lawyer George Bacon yesterday against the Camden National Bank for alleged false arrest of one of his clients.

The injuries received by brakeman George Wolf, of the Atlantic City Railroad, who fell under his train at Albion on Tuesday, resulted fatally at the Cooper Hospital.

James Painter, colored, of Third and Spruce streets, was scalded about the arms and legs yesterday by a pot of boiling coffee upsetting on him. He was taken to the Cooper Hospital.

Judge Miller in the Circuit Court yesterday heard testimony in a \$10,000 damage suit, instituted by Frederick Smearer against the Camden and Suburban Railway Company for injuries received in a collision.

Cooper Hospital authorities say that Mrs. Ellen Beck, of 414 Emerald street, who was brutally assaulted by a man early Tuesday morning at Fourth and Jasper streets, will be disabled for life. Joseph Morrow, who is accused of being Mrs. Beck's assailant, is still locked up at the City Hall.

The Newburg Dredging Company notified the Camden County Board of Freeholders yesterday that they proposed dredging Cooper's Creek at the Federal street bridge at night in order to interfere with travel as little as possible. Efforts will be made to have the work put off until after the State street bridge is completed.

Because Saloonkeeper Edward Mulligan, of 22 South Eighth street, would not admit Robert Nichols to his place late Tuesday night, Nichols turned on him and severely hit him on the hand. Nichols also hit the thumb of Policeman McCloug when the latter arrested him. Recorder Nowrey yesterday held Nichols in \$500 bail.

William D. Brown yesterday resumed his position as Secretary of the Commission of Public Instruction, from which he was ousted by the reformers. George Cline, who was elected to succeed Mr. Brown, turned over the office without opposition. Secretary Brown resumes control under a decision of the Supreme Court, which declares that he is entitled to the position until the expiration of his full term, in May, 1900.
